

The Atlanta Urban Intern Program

Spend a year creating an authentic community committed to freedom and justice for young women threatened by sexualization and trafficking in an American city.

The Atlanta Urban Intern Program (AUIP) empowers young women to take action against sexual trafficking in Atlanta by collaborating with a variety of local agencies to mentor, advocate, and create authentic community around this issue at street level. AUIP needs four exceptional young women to dedicate a year of service that will include:

- LIVING IN INTENTIONAL COMMUNITY at Emmaus House, a mission of the Episcopal Church located in Peoplestown, an Atlanta neighborhood shadowed by trafficking;
- PARTICIPATING in The Liberation Project in collaboration with Fulton County Juvenile Court; this project offers supportive relationships to girls at risk of trafficking;
- CREATING (with the GreenWell Project) a community garden with middle school girls from Peoplestown and using the garden to teach cooking, nutrition, horticulture and construction;
- WORKING WITH LOCAL AGENCIES in Atlanta that target youth susceptible to sexual exploitation; and
- PERSONAL REFLECTION and spiritual development.

Applicants must be between 22-25 years old, a college graduate or someone with equivalent life experience. Interns do not need to be members of the Episcopal Church, but they must have some personal, meaningful relationship with a Christian church. Doubt or skepticism about this relationship will be welcomed as a sign of faith.
